Another meeting, classified as a public hearing, was held on October 3 at the Fine Arts Hall of Columbus College. Those councilmen in attendance were Milton Hirsch, Mayor Jack Mickle, Allen Nicas, Hank Barbian, Jack Bsssett, A.J. McClung, Jack Land, Bob Wright, James Jernigan, and Phillip Batistini.

Mayor Mickle opened the hearing by stating that he wished that we would all leave in one mind and one accord. This was never reached because of the Mayor's decision that a vote would not be taken.

Many area residents were given a chance to speak out their views, but it did no good. Local businessmen also spoke up, but the council still was not moved one way or the other.

When questions were put to the Mayor or the council they were either disregarded or were replied to with words of no significance. During the entire duration of the meeting, the councilmen showed a non-caring attitude.

When speaking, contradictions were a frequent event in the majority of Mayor Mickle's statements. When numerous councilmen spoke, it was apparent that they were giving the group the runaround. In fact the contradictions and the blowing of one's own horn lulled the group to sleep.

The "Save Our Homes" Committee would like to see the airport moved. If moved it could be everything we could ever want. Our health and homes would be safe. The attendance area of Shaw High would be preserved, the surrounding environment enhanced, and our future secure.

I feel that it would be a great injustice to our generation by limiting our future. Do you care what your life will be like ten years from now? If so, STAND UP AND BE COUNTED.

The following are thos comments taken from a recent poll of SHS students and teachers.

One sophomore stated, "I think the open classrooms are working out really well. I like them better than regular classes because it gives you a better chance to learn from different types of teachers".

Another said, "I think open classrooms are alright, because you get tired of listening to the same teacher all the time." One student commented, "I think it's a challenge to the students to prove that they can operate under the intensity of an open classroom. I enjoy it."

A senior remarked, "I really like open classrooms; it makes the subject more interesting and having more than one teacher makes it not so boring."

Ms. Wilson, a teacher at SHS, responded, "I like it and think it will work out, if the students and teachers will cooperate with one another."

One junior replied, "I think the open classrooms are working out real well. You get a chance to meet a lot more people that go to your school. The open classroom is more interesting and I think you can learn more about the subject you are taking."

Mr. Meltzer, a member of the science department, added, "The open classrooms have begun to function well, The first few week were very chaotic, but things have been improving. The biggest drawback as a teacher has been in trying to learn names and personalities. I'm enjoying the experience at Shaw very much."

Another student said, "I think they are a challenge in a sense of the word. I really can perform to my full capacity."

Another teacher, Ms. Gearing, remarked, "Needs work. The biggest problem is materials. As soon as we get more desks, chairs and blackboards we will be able to fully extend the open concept area. Open concept is terrific and can work well for the students."


We, the staff, feel that cooperation is the key to the success of our open class system. Won't YOU help make it work?

Heavy Metal: Where Did It Go?

Led Zeppelin, Black Sabbath, Grand Funk Railroad, Deep Purple, and Bloodrock. What do all of these nemes have in common? They are all a part of rock music called "heavy metal." Led Zeppelin, the original heavy metal eardrum breakers, has had more influence on this particular type of music than any other heavy metal group. Jimmy Page, the group's lead guitarist and chief producer, whost lightning fingers have set a standard in rock guitar, has become an idol of sorts in the eyes of many young guitarists. They aim for that point of perfection that Page has seemed to achieve.

Heavy metal's heyday was from 1968 until early 1973. By '73, the Sixties were goneand people were on the lookout for new trends in rock music. Attention all Shaw students who did not attend the "Midnife Special"/"White Witch" concert on October 1; four dollars could have gotten you in to see a great rock and roll experience. "Foreplay," "White Witch," and "Midnite Special" turned out a fantastic show for the money, although they played before fewer than five hundred people.

"Foreplay," a band from Atlanta, kicked off this jam with "a tune by some friends of ours" - "Heartbreaker." "Foreplay" (whose name was changed to "4-play" in the promotions, for some strange reason) was a fantastic opening band, although they were plagued with power difficulties throughout their performance.

The music was good, but they spent too much time jumping around and playing other people's music. Although they played an excellent Zeppelin medley from the movie *The Song Remains The Same*, this isn't what you expect from a headline band, is it?

I. General

- A. The Center will be opened from 7:30 A.M. to 4:00 P.M.
- B. In order to provide maximum circulation. materials must be properly inventoried and located:
- 1. Periodicals and newspapers should not be borrowed.
 - 2. All materials removed from the Center must follow proper check-out procedures.
 - 3. Materials will not checked out by a student in a teacher's name without a written note to the Media Center staff from the teacher.
- II. Acquisition of Materials The Media Center staff will cooperate fully with faculty in order to secure an adequate, workable collection of print and no-print material to implement the curriculum. Previews and no-print material may be requested through Mr. Ivery.

- A. Materials checked out faculty may be kept for an indefinite period of time.
- B. All Media may be placed on reserve for students use during the school and may be checked out over night by a teacher's request.
- C. Reference materials such as encyclopedias, almanacs, pamphlets, and other books may be checked out over night.
- D. Fines will be charged for over due books.
- E. All AV equipment and material must follow proper check out procedures because they must be accounted for.
- F. Due to the expected heavy use of media and equipment within the open space and team teaching strategies, hardware and material must be requested at least 24 hours in advance.
- G. Requests for materials from the Instructional Materials must be re-

ferred to Mr. Ivery by 12:00 noon, two days prior to showing.

- H. Please do not leave Av materials outside the class areas or Center. * I. There are no materials in the Media Center that can not be checked out.
- * Mrs. Parker would like to make a special notice to I. There is nothing in the Media Center that can not be checked out to help you in any way. All she asks is that you please follow proper procedures in checking out materials.

In their first game of the season they lost to a powerful Columbus High team by the score of 34-6.


The only score of the night came when tight end David Watson scored on an 8 yard pass reception from Tim Goff.
